Report on the Results of the 2001 Census

Introduction

The following pages contain some basic statistical information about the parish of Odd Rode. It has extracted primarily from the 2001 Census, in some instances with a look back to the 1991 Census. This approach has some limitations in that classifications and tabulations have changed and it has not always been possible to make comparisons between these censuses. Travel To Work and Migration Statistics from the 2001 Census have not yet been released and the tabulations shown in these pages are therefore based on the 1991 Census.

Basics about Odd Rode

Odd Rode is one of 23 civil parishes and town councils within the borough of Congleton in the county of Cheshire. It comprises 1,539 hectares (3,803 acres, 6.1 sq miles) or 7.3% of the borough area. The population according to the 2001 Census was 5,562 persons or 6.1% of the borough's population.


It is seen from the above tables that the population of Odd Rode increased by 316 persons or about 6% of the population in 1991. This is relatively less than the borough area, but more than the county.

It should also be noted that below the age of 29 Odd rode has got relatively fewer people than the larger areas. For instance 'only' 11.25% of the population aged 0-9 against 11.94% in the county as a whole. This may have implications for our schools.


Age Change

Not only are our younger people fewer in number at present, but their number has declined between 1991 and 2001. This will have implications for the services provided to young people.

Conversely the number of people aged 70 and above is increasing with implications for this part of the populations.




General Health

Obviously by far the greates part of the population is of good health and suffer no 'Limiting Long-term Illness' (LLI) (an illness which limits a person's daily activities or the work they do). However, it appears that in 2001 there were 420 people in Odd Rode whose health was not good and who suffered from a LLI. At 7.61% this is a higher proportion than in the borough and county areas as a whole.

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


Dwelling Types

It may tell us something about the wealth of the residents of Odd Rode that by far the most dominant type of dwelling in the area is that of semi-detached. The number of detached and terraced type dwellings is also significant while the number of other types are negligible..


Household Tenure

The number of households that live in accommodation rented from the Council has in Odd Rode declined by over 10%. This is due to the right to buy policy and other policies aimed at transferring dwellings out of the control of local councils.

At the same time Owner Occupation has increased by about 4% and is now more dominant locally than in the wider areas of which Odd Rode is a part.


Travel To Work

There is a very high proportion of people travelling to work by 'motor vehicle' (car, van or motor cycle) in Odd Rode and a higher proportion than in the Congleton and Cheshire areas as a whole, 75.41% in Odd Rode as against 65.82%. At the same time the number of people using public transport (rail and bus) is very low. Could these facts be used in an argument to improve especially the bus-services in Odd Rode? We need to think about the effect this high level of personal transport is having on our narrow country lanes?

The following tabulations show how dependent Odd Rode is on neighbouring towns for its economic well-being. Especially it should be noted the big numbers that travel to work in Stoke-on-Trent.

Car Availability

We have already noted the large number of people living in Odd Rode who travel to work by means of a motor vehicle. This notion is further underlined by the number of households who have cars or vans available.

The proportion of households who have no such means of transport available have fallen from 16.1% in 1991 to 10.41% in 2001, lower than in the wider areas. Conversely the proportion of people who have 2 or more cars or vans available have increased from about 38% to nearly 50%.

Migration into Odd Rode

The tabulations on Migration into Odd Rode albeit from 1991 show how Odd Rode depend on neighbouring towns for its continuing growth. In 1991 most people had come from the Potteries including Kidsgrove and Newcastle and from the Cheshire towns of Alsager and Congleton.
